California State University Fullerton (CSUF) is a leading campus of the California State University system, serving as an intellectual and cultural center for Southern California and a driver of workforce and economic development. The mission of CSUF relies upon high-quality teaching and learning opportunities centered upon diversity, equity, inclusion, and social justice values. As of Fall 2025, the university serves over 45,000 students and employs more than 4,100 faculty and staff.

The safety and security of the CSUF Titan community is a top priority. CSUF uniquely provides an inclusive framework of services, resources, and programs in a systems approach to support diversity and community success through an integrated culture of holistic safety. The CSUF Police Department (CSUF PD) is honored to partner with the community to support a safe, inclusive, and welcoming university for Titans to thrive.

The annual California Campus Safety Plan is part of an ongoing effort to promote safety and security

at CSUF and to comply with the California State Education Code, Chapter 16, of the Donahoe Higher Education Act, Section 67380. This report highlights applicable methods for summoning law enforcement assistance, security safeguards for facilities and activities, actions taken over the past 18 months to enhance safety, and changes in safety precautions planned for the next 24 months.

AVAILABILITY, LOCATION, AND METHODS TO SUMMON LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE

CSUF PD provides 24-hour service to protect and render aid to the Titan community at Cal State Fullerton located in the city of Fullerton, California. All applicable laws and codes of the State of California may be enforced at the university. Any person at the university who needs assistance, notices someone who requires emergency services, or sees something suspicious is urged to contact CSUF PD promptly.

Contacting CSUF PD:

Students, staff, faculty, and visitors can report all in-progress suspicious or criminal acts, as well as all police, fire, and medical/mental health emergencies to the CSUF PD by calling 911 or using any campus emergency blue telephone.

There are over 237 emergency blue light phones located across the university, which allow someone to speak directly to a highly trained and California state-certified 911 emergency dispatcher at CSUF PD. When the button is pushed, the blue strobe light flashes from the top of the phone tower, the CSUF PD dispatcher is notified immediately, and a department team member is dispatched to the location.

To file a non-emergency police report, the community can call (657) 278-2515, or reports can be made in person at the CSUF Police Department, located at 800 N. State College Blvd, Fullerton, CA 92831, at the corner of State College Boulevard and Gymnasium Drive.

When Reporting a Crime to Law Enforcement:

- Give clear and accurate information.
- Provide suspect and vehicle descriptions, including the last direction of travel.
- Do not hang up until asked to do so.

University Confidential Non-Emergency Reporting Options:

While the university provides 24-hour law enforcement services, it should be noted that there are also non-emergency confidential resources and reporting options available to students.

- A Counselor within Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) is available 24 hours a day by calling (657) 278-3040.

CSUF Facilities Located Off-site:

Facilities such as the Grand Central Arts Center and Zzyzx Desert Consortium do not have CSUF PD personnel located on campus, nor do they monitor the locations. Immediately report all in-progress suspicious or criminal acts, as well as all police, fire, and medical emergencies to the local police agency by calling 911.

SPECIAL SAFEGUARDS FOR FACILITIES OR ACTIVITIES

CSUF PD conducts routine patrols of buildings, parking structures, residence halls and university grounds to monitor security and address safety concerns.

Security of, and Access to, University Facilities:

Some spaces in campus buildings and facilities remain locked throughout the day, but are accessible to authorized individuals via university-issued keys and/or a keypad code. The codes are changed at regular intervals, and when individuals should no longer have access to the work area. University buildings are generally secured between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. and on weekends when not in use. However, they can still be accessed when secured by individuals with department approval through issued keys and/or a keypad code.

As set forth in the University’s Addendum to the CSU Systemwide Time, Place, and Manner Policy (TPM Policy) , <https://freespeech.fullerton.edu/time-place-manner/>, university property is defined as:

- **Public Areas:** A Public Area is university property that is available for public assembly, marches, demonstrations, protests and debate. Right of access and equality of access are

provided in these areas, so long as activities are lawful and do not disrupt university operations. Content-based restrictions are prohibited, but reasonable time, place and manner regulations will be applied. Spontaneous activities may take place in Public Areas without pre-scheduling or reservations. All areas on campus are subject to being unavailable during times of an emergency.

- **Limited Areas:** A Limited Area is university property available to the public but due to business operations, safety concerns, or other important university interests, it is not open for assembling, marching, demonstrating or protesting. Activities in these areas may require scheduling and reservations with the university, and are available on a limited basis, subject to campus regulations that are narrowly tailored to address the university's legitimate business interests.

Access to and use of certain designated university property must be scheduled and registered in advance, as noted in the list of university property set forth below. Certain uses of university property may be subject to fees, require liability insurance, and/or an indemnity agreement which must be provided by those who seek to engage in such uses. All users assume responsibility for all damage they cause to university property. Failure to pay for damage to university property may jeopardize future access to and/or use of university property and can result in discipline for students and employees who are responsible for the damage, as well as civil or criminal action.

- **Non-Public Areas:** Except for areas designated as Public Areas and Limited Areas, all remaining university property, including the interiors of all buildings and facilities are Non-Public Areas. These areas are not open to the public and the university can restrict access to Non-Public Areas on a content and viewpoint neutral basis.

Cal State Fullerton Operating Hours:

No one shall enter or otherwise remain on university property between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. or at such other times as published or posted by university housing and residential programs and other similarly specialized university programs.

This prohibition shall not apply to persons possessing valid written authorization from a university official, persons on legitimate university-related business, or persons attending a specific university-sponsored event. Those persons with legitimate university business reasons, valid written authorization, and/or attending a university-sponsored event, shall be allowed to remain on and access university property as permitted in their authorization or through the duration of the specific event, after which time they shall leave university property without any appreciable delay. This prohibition shall not apply to persons transiting on a roadway or path designated as open to the public.

University Student Housing and Residential Engagement:

Housing and Residential Engagement, along with the CSUF PD, collaborate closely to promote a safe

and welcoming living and learning environment for residents. Each student residing at the university is granted access to their residence hall utilizing their Titan ID access card. The resident key card provides access to common areas, bathrooms, and student-specific rooms 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Public safety cameras are located throughout the residential community, but not under continuous monitoring.

University Safety and Security Camera System:

CSUF PD operates a closed-circuit television (CCTV) camera and automated license plate recognition (ALPR) system to further enhance the safety and security in public areas of the university. This technology can help deter potential offenders who recognize the elevated risk of apprehension from such systems and support the detection of criminal acts. Information the cameras provide can be extremely valuable in assisting law enforcement in identifying suspects.

Security Considerations Used in Maintenance of Campus Facilities:

CSUF PD is responsible for providing police services to all university facilities located on the main campus in Fullerton. The university participates in Crime Prevention through Environmental Design for planning safety enhancements. Environmental Health and Safety (EH&S), Risk Management and Compliance, and CSUF PD conduct regular surveys throughout the university to support the maintenance of facilities, parking lots, pedestrian walkways, and building exteriors.

Additionally, the EH&S team coordinates an annual university safety walk with CSUF Titan community partners to survey outdoor lighting, shrubbery, walkways, and other areas for potential repair and/or recommended safety enhancements.

SECURITY AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

Security awareness programs are offered to the CSUF Titan community that address university security policies, procedures, and practices, which encourage students and employees to be responsible for their personal safety and support the safety of others.

CSUF PD also provides enhanced services to assist in crime prevention, including:

- Emergency blue telephones are available at various locations throughout the campus.
- Safety escort services for students, faculty, staff, and visitors.
- Lighting surveys for buildings, outdoor areas, and parking lots.
- 911 capability from all university phones and mobile phones.
- Safety and security cameras are in public areas throughout the university.
- Crime prevention, safety, and security training.

ACTIONS IN THE LAST 18 MONTHS TO ENHANCE SAFETY

- CSUF PD embarked on a vision to become the model of policing within the CSU system and nationally by listening to the CSUF Titan community and implementing structural changes to enhance safety.
- CSUF PD initiated an operational paradigm shift to create a new holistic and inclusive tiered-safety response system to match the best type of responder with each call for service, which is centered within these four pillars:
 - A Department Culture of Holistic & Inclusive Safety
 - Enhance Accountability through Data Transparency
 - Operational Paradigm Shift – A New Holistic Tiered Response Model
 - Embracing Community Engagement & Partnerships
- CSUF PD initiated a new holistic and inclusive tiered-safety response system to serve the safety and well-being of the whole Titan community by deconstructing the historic safety system, which relies upon the police as the primary professional who responds to all types of incidents when called by the campus community. This new safety response system is enhancing community safety by matching the best type of responder with each call for service.
 - CSUF Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS), in partnership with CSUF PD, developed and established a new Crisis Response Team (unarmed) to begin initially responding Monday through Friday during business hours to community members experiencing a mental health crisis that does not involve weapons or threats of violence.
 - CSUF PD enhanced the operational response role of the Campus Safety Specialists, who are full-time unarmed civilian safety professionals who are now assigned to patrol shifts 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to respond to incidents that do not involve weapons or threats of violence.
 - CSUF PD police officers continued to deter, prevent, and expeditiously respond to help protect the Titan community from violence and crime.
- CSUF hired two new Emergency Management and Continuity staff members who report to the CSUF PD Chief of Police. The staff oversees the development and implementation of both the university's Emergency Management Program, including the CSUF Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), CSUF Emergency Operations Center (EOC), Building Marshal

Program, and the CSUF Continuity Program (CP) which are aligned with the CSU Chancellor's Office directives for Emergency Management and Continuity, as well as state and federal legislation and guidance. CSUF PD completed and published a new comprehensive CSUF Continuity Program, which included the acquisition of business continuity software to support the development of 34 continuity of operations plans for university departments and units with essential functions.

- The Chief's Advisory Board (CAB), consisting of faculty, staff, and students, was reinstated to help provide a vital voice for our diverse Titan community to share their views and ideas to enhance university safety through communication, community engagement, transparency, and increased trust. The CAB members' counsel advises the Chief of Police on safety matters impacting the CSUF community in order to pursue impactful measures aimed at implementing effective safety services to support a safe, inclusive, and welcoming university for all Titans to thrive. The CAB meets monthly during the Fall and Spring semesters. <https://police.fullerton.edu/about-us/cab.html>
- CSUF PD developed and posted new transparency dashboards on its website to further foster trust and accountability within our community. The interactive dashboards are designed to enhance transparency allowing the community to explore data related to police stops, use of force, and other key metrics related to our operations, ensuring that our practices align with the highest standards of public service and Titan core values. The initial four dashboards are now available for viewing, including: RIPA Stop Data, Activity Statistics, CSUF PD Demographic data, and Complaints. - CSUF Risk Management and Compliance and CSUF PD collaborated to develop and formalize a new Threat Consultation Team (TCT) to support the community in a proactive, collaborative, coordinated, objective, and thoughtful approach to the identification, assessment, intervention, prevention, and management of situations that may reasonably pose a threat to the safety and well-being of the CSUF Titan community. The TCT meets monthly.
- CSUF Risk Management and Compliance and CSUF PD collaborated to develop and implement the new CSUF Workplace Violence Prevention Program to support safety and security, which includes a new policy, reporting options, and available training for employees. <https://hr.fullerton.edu/risk-management/workplace-violence-prevention-program/>
- Police personnel participated in the multidisciplinary Behavioral Intervention Team (BIT), which consisted of the Dean of Students Office, Counseling and Psychological Services, Student Conduct, Office of Civil Rights and Equity, Disability Student Services, CARE Services, and other university faculty and staff to support students in crisis.

- As part of the systematic approach to enhancing safety for the Titan community, the university added over 300 security cameras and automated license plate cameras, which have been integrated into the CSUF PD emergency dispatch center.
- CSUF PD applied for, and received over \$1.1 million in grant funding to support safety enhancement projects, including \$550k from the Department of Justice to support the Mobile Crisis Response Team, \$300k from the Department of Justice to enhance pedestrian safety from vehicle intrusions onto campus pathways, \$335k from CalOES to update and enhance the CSUF PD 911 dispatch center, and \$35k from the Office of Transportation Safety to support bicycle, scooter, and pedestrian safety through education.
- CSUF PD conducted two full-scale active shooter trainings in collaboration with local police and fire agencies to jointly prepare for an effective response in the event of an emergency at the university. CSUF PD police officers completed California Peace Officer and Standards (POST) certified active shooter training in 2025 and are trained to run towards the violence and address the situation to stop the threat.
- CSUF PD jointly developed enhanced communication protocols with Strategic Communication, including a crisis communication plan and matrix that streamlined notification to the campus community of dangers, critical incidents, and/or emergencies.
- CSUF PD developed and held two Community Police Academies to provide Titans with an opportunity to learn more about the police department and safety on campus. Community members participated in the Force Options Simulator during the academy and received Active Shooter training, including the *Run-Hide-Fight* method.
- In 2025, CSUF PD participated in 68 community engagement events and delivered 69 safety presentations to the CSUF Titan community. Additionally, CSUF PD partnered with Student Affairs to provide safety awareness presentations during student orientation programs.
- In April 2025, the CSUF Social Science Research Center – College of Humanities and Social Sciences conducted the *Experiences with, Perceptions, and Expectations of Law Enforcement Results of a CSUF Campus Community Survey* which was administered on behalf of the CSUF Chief’s Advisory Board. Two key points of data from this survey included:
 - (1) CSUF PD was the agency that “received the most favorable ratings across most interaction and perception measures.”
 - (2) Further, “CSUF PD was rated more positively than other police agencies on trust, fairness, and accountability.”

CHANGES IN SAFETY PRECAUTIONS ANTICIPATED DURING THE NEXT 24 MONTHS

- CSUF PD will continue to pursue a vision of becoming the model of policing within the CSU system and nationally by listening to the Titan community and implementing structural changes to enhance inclusive safety.
- CSUF PD will continue developing a holistic and inclusive tiered-safety response system to serve the safety and well-being of the whole Titan community by deconstructing the historic safety system, which relies upon the police as the primary professional who responds to all types of incidents when called by the campus community. This new safety response system is striving to match the best type of responder with each call for service.
- CSUF PD will publish an updated university's Emergency Management Program, which includes the CSUF Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and the CSUF Emergency Operations Center (EOC) structure. The CSUF PD emergency management and continuity team will also train members for the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and CSUF building marshals to support the university during an emergency or disaster response.
- CSUF PD will pursue accreditation through the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators (IACLEA) to affirm our adherence to the highest standards in university public safety, further ensuring a safe and secure environment for Titans to thrive.
- CSUF PD will continue to prioritize community engagement and safety training opportunities and promote these opportunities with Strategic Communications to support a safe, inclusive, and welcoming university for Titans to thrive. These efforts will include additional Community Police Academy sessions and active shooter safety presentations.
- Continue planning and conducting annual full-scale active shooter training exercises at CSUF in collaboration with university partners, local police agencies, and the fire department to support an effective response.
- CSUF PD, in collaboration with university partners and Motorola, will update and enhance the CSUF PD Dispatch Center 9-1-1 emergency system with grant funding provided by CalOES.
- CSUF PD, in collaboration with Capital Programs and Facilities Management (CPFM), will install additional vehicle safety bollards across university property to further enhance community safety by blocking access to vehicles on campus pedestrian pathways.
- CSUF PD, in collaboration with CPFM will update access control for the exterior entrance/exit doors of buildings across the university by adding electronic card key access to support automatic lock down ability and enhance security for the community.

RECORDS OF ON-CAMPUS CRIME

This report is a separate and distinct document from the Annual Security Report required under the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act).

California Education Code 67380(a)(1)(A):

California State University campuses are required by California Education Code 67380(a)(1)(A) to compile records of all occurrences reported to campus police, campus security personnel, or campus safety authorities of, and arrests for, crimes that are committed on campus and that involve violence, hate violence, theft, destruction of property, illegal drugs, or alcohol intoxication, and to make this information available within two business days if requested by students, prospective students, employees, or the media.
